College Principal's Report



Reading the many stories in our May newsletter describing what our staff and students are achieving through cooperative learning minds us why last year was so difficult for some students. Young people thrive working in teams that are focused on achieving positive outcomes for everyone. Even though this only covers a few weeks I hope that you too are delighted to see our young people, not only participating but excelling in so many fields.

The trip to Cape Schanck for all students in Years 7 and 8 was designed to bring to life the novel they are currently reading. Some of our students had never seen the sea outside beyond our city beaches and many had no

idea about the purpose of a light house. This excursion helped bring the book alive and further develop their English language placing them in a much stronger position to express their understandings. Avoiding learning in such an immersive experience is impossible, even for the most reluctant reader.

For those who have had time to visit the MY SCHOOL website you would be aware college performs the State every year in the percentage of students who move into meaningful pathways when they leave us. The majority of Year 12 students move on to university and TAFE while a small number enter apprenticeships. Our focus on student connecting learning with the real world at every possibility is a contributing factor. From working with executives from the Australian Business Community Network to succeeding through to the finals of competitive interschool volleyball and many others in between you will see great examples of this together with reviews by students who participated. And this has resulted in continual improvement in our reading outcomes. The work behind the scenes by teachers and our Library Coordinator has illustrated the level of commitment we all know is required to make such a big change. We can see these skills being applied by the increasing number of students joining interschool debating and the participation at the National Constitution Convention. We all know these written and oral skills are not just skills for school, but critical in every aspect of life beyond school.

Naplan assessment for Years 7 and 9 students has begun. This is the same program that your child participated in during Grade 3 and Grade 5 if they attended an Australian school. Some students can get quite anxious about these tests and it is important to assure them that these are a snapshot in time. While they should do their very best they should not be worried about the process. The same approach should apply to our exams in later the term.

The point of these exams for junior students is actually to teach them how to prepare, manage time, look for critical information, answer questions succinctly, and, time permitting, check over their work before submitting. If they can master these skills in the early years, they will find VCE far less challenging.

However, you know your children better than anyone so if you think there are any indications that cause you concern please do not hesitate to contact their Home Group teacher who can organise support if required.

In closing, I draw your attention to the celebration plans for our 50th anniversary. Deliberately scheduled to fall after the VCE exams, we intend to celebrate this important event with as many of our current and ex-students as we can. There will be a formal dinner on Thursday 25th November and a gathering at school the following Sunday at the

College where the celebrations will continue. Please put the dates in your diary and help us spread the news. If you have any great ideas re the planning, please contact Carol Picciani through the main office. We are always looking for great ideas.

I thank each and every family for your ongoing support. We are very lucky to have such a supportive community.










Junior English Program

The Year 7 and 8 English excursion to the Cape Schanck Lighthouse during Term 1 brought the study of Dianne Wolfer's Lighthouse Girl to life. The view from the top of the lighthouse to the wild ocean below allowed the students to envisage Fay's experience living in Breaksea Island's lighthouse and communicating with departing Australian soldiers during WWI.

Despite a lengthy journey to and from the seaside, the students returned with an appreciation for the important role of Australia's lighthouses and their keepers throughout the nation's history.

Students and teachers shared their experience of the day in the following:

Cape Schanck Lighthouse student reviews

Cape Schanck Lighthouse is located on the southern tip of Mornington Peninsula. The year 7 and 8 students travelled approxi-2 hours from mately Thomastown Secondary Collage. The experience was new as we were exposed to how the Cape Schanck Lighthouse works the surroundings around the lighthouse. it was beautiful to see the environment ocean waves crashing against the rocks. We learnt that Cape Schanck Lighthouse was constructed using limestone blocks, rock face base course, tapered window and door openings and a rare stone spiral staircase (one of only three pre-1863 surviving Lighthouses to have a stone spiral staircase) and how the lighthouse functions in the night. Our time at the lighthouse offered a tranquil, soothing peaceful experience, in addition to broadening our understanding of how Fay from 'The Lighthouse Girl' communicated with the soldiers back in WW1.

In term 1, our English classes went to Cape Schanck Lighthouse. It was fun to be with my class while learning new things about the book we were reading! The bus drive took forever, but my friends and I didn't waste a minute as we talked all the way there and back. When we arrived, the students were divided into three groups, and we rotated our visit to three different locations. My favourite one was looking from the top of the lighthouse despite it being a daringly steep climb!

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National Constitutional Convention



Congratulations goes to Angela Mladenovski who was selected to attend this years National Constitutional Convention. The 26th annual convention was held on the 24th and 25th of March this year and traditionally would have been hosted in Canberra. However, due to COVID restrictions it was held in Melbourne at the prestigious Windsor Hotel just outside of Parliament house. Angela was chosen from around 300 other applicants from private, Catholic and government schools to participate in this program.

The topic of discussion this year was whether or not the preamble of the Commonwealth Constitution should be altered to represent a modern Australia.

So, what is a preamble? A preamble to a constitution

is a short piece of text designed to introduce the constitution.

So, what is the Australian constitution? The Constitution establishes the composition of the Australian Parliament, it basically describes how Parliament works and what powers it has. It took effect on 1 January 1901.

However, Australia does not have a preamble to the Constitution itself. The text commonly referred to as the preamble to the Commonwealth of Australia Constitution Act 1900 currently reads as follows;

COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA CONSTITUTION ACT - PREAMBLE

WHEREAS the people of New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, and Tasmania, humbly relying on the blessing of Almighty God, have agreed to unite in one indissoluble Federal Commonwealth under the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and under the Constitution hereby established:

And whereas it is expedient to provide for the admission into the Commonwealth of other Australasian Colonies and possessions of the Queen:

Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows: NEWSLETTER PAGE 7

It has been argued by various groups within our society that this piece of writing is outdated, boring and describes nothing about Australia or its inhabitants past, present and future. The students were asked to examine preambles from other countries and decide whether or not to delete

the existing one in our constitution or re-write it to reflect modern Australia. The following is the transcript of the 2 days work that the students undertook. A most impressive effort from a group of 25 exceptionally talented young Victorians.



As the people of Australia we are united across States and Territories to serve the common good. Interconnected through culture and heritage, we recognise the First Nations peoples, whose sovereignty was never ceded, and on whose land we reside and swear to protect. Through these aspects we strengthen our Australian identity. We shall live our lives under the rule of law, in respect to our democratic values set out by the Commonwealth.

We acknowledge the ever changing nature of Australian identity, recognising that time will bring new peoples, cultures and ideals.

We pay our respects to those who have served and continue to serve our nation in times of peace and conflict.

We pledge to be people who strive for equality, regardless of gender, race, faith, or culture while swearing to protect the honourable Constitution of Australia.

This communiqué will be forwarded to the Australian government with its recommendations. Well done Angela et al.


STEAM Club



Many of the most vital projects and careers happening across the globe involve using STEAM – Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Maths –




The library collaborates with the students Homegroup teacher to provide time and direction to build lifelong learning behaviours. For more information visit:

O'Brien Icehouse - Docklands


