Principal's Report Continued...

Every four years all government schools undergo a review process. This is to provide the opportunity to reflect on the growth achieved over the past four years and to plan for the next four years. The review runs over three days through October and November but should not create too many interruptions to the normal running of the school. There may be visitors to classrooms during this time but always in the company of a school leader. Certainly, parents are welcome to contribute to the process. Parent members on school council will obviously be involved. The final report will be tabled at school council.

I'm sure you haven't been able to escape the constant news coverage on teacher shortage. For Australia this was no surprise as we have been aware that many teachers were reaching retirement age. However, the shortage is not only being experienced in Australia but across the world with UNESCO predicting the world will need 69 million teachers by 2030. The Victorian State Government is looking at a number of ways to address the problem but currently a number of schools are needing to combine classes, send senior students home if they have no classes and principals are going back to the classroom. So far Thomastown has been very fortunate in that we have had very little staff movement and very few staff away sick. We have also retained a number of our staff currently on leave or retired, as relieving teachers. They nominate days when they are available to cover classes. Having professionals who already know our students and how the school operates means disruptions are minimised.

COVID followed by inflation means I am acutely aware that many families, not only locally but across the country, are struggling to meet the ever-increasing home payments, rent increases, transport, food and other essential costs. We want school to be a place that provides support for families and allows students to learn having all their requirements, not to be an additional strain on family life. Please don't hesitate to contact your home group teacher or myself should you need any assistance meeting the cost of excursions or even uniform.

I hope you enjoy reading the articles written by our staff and students. It will give you a glimpse of the many opportunities available and I hope you will encourage your children to contribute to the next newsletter.


The World Kick-boxing Championships

The World Kickboxing Championships is the pinnacle of the sport of Kickboxing and will take place in Portugal in November. Elizabeth El-Jarid will start in Italy where she will settle in before traveling to Venice to participate in training camps for 8 days. She then travels to Portugal where she will compete over 6 days for the world title. The competition has around 20 competitors per division. They will fight in light contact kickboxing that is regulated by a referee to ensure that there are no significant or damaging contacts from both kicks or punches that can be directed at the face and the body. Libby has been training tirelessly for 6 years for her opportunity to represent Australia on the world stage. She has finally reached her goal.

Miss World Australia

Melani reached the Preliminary Final in August 2022 and made it through the State Final in April 2023. On the 18th of August, Melani Murdjevska competed in the Miss World Australia 2023 National Final representing her state Victoria along with 32 other Finalists. She participated in a week-long competition from the 14th – 18th of August for Miss World Australia, during which she got the opportunity to stay at Mercure Gold Coast Resort alongside other national finalists. Throughout the week, she engaged in various events which included sports challenges, interviews with the judge's panel, an international model runway challenge and several social media challenges. These activities were designed to asses skills and qualities of the contestants. ultimately lead to the selection of the finalists on the MWA final night. Melani explains that, Miss World Australia goes beyond mere aesthetics but emphasises on the concept of Beauty With A Purpose. Melani was recognised as the recipient of the 'Beauty with A Purpose' award on the final night, as a result of her dedicated efforts in raising over \$26,000 for Variety, The Children's Charity and the 3rd highest fundraiser in Australia.

On the evening of the Miss World Australia Final, Melani achieved an astounding accomplishment by securing a place within the Top 12 finalists Nationally. This achievement holds immense significance, as she was the Youngest Contestant competing Australia wide.

YEAR 12 FANCY DRESS DAY



STEAM CLUB 3D PrintACar Challenge

Thomastown Secondary College participated in this year's 3D PrintACar Challenge, an annual competition run by the Quantum Victoria Maths and Science Specialty Centre. Teams of 2 to 4 students from primary and secondary schools around the state design and build a miniature race car, using a 3D printer to produce all of the major parts. The teams document their learning in a digital portfolio as they research the physics of car design and test their materials. The cars are then raced on a miniature race track using a wire for guidance and compressed gas cylinders for power.

This was TSC's second year of competing, and we had two teams participate. Team.zip was comprised of students from Blue and Gold Units, with Dong Quach and Ezekiel Milczarek working on car design and Tina Bui and Irhanna Muhd Irwan making the portfolio. The other team, Spanish Inquisition, includes two Year 11 students: car designer Flynn Rogan and photographer and graphic designer Minas Pazinas. Sienna Ristevski from Red Unit took over portfolio duties from a third VCE student who was unable to continue. Both teams worked hard through lunchtimes and even home group sessions to complete and assemble their cars, finish their beautiful and informative portfolios. They all gathered in the Science Office on Friday 18th August to celebrate and watch the qualifying race. Team Zip's car was sadly unable to race due to a technical flaw, but Spanish Inquisition earned a spot in the finals as the third fastest car out of 19 competing teams. They received near-perfect marks on both car design and portfolio and are eager to revise their work ahead of the Finals Day race at Quantum Victoria on 17th November. We wish them good luck and great reaction times. Any students interested in improving their research and portfolio skills or learning more about physics through an interesting project are encouraged to join the STEAM Lab on Monday lunchtimes to start practicing their 3D printing skills.





Pathways & Careers Programs

The Innovate Program

Over 4 weeks a group of year 7/8 students had the opportunity to participate in the ABCN Innovate program help at Vanguard. Innovate is designed to inspire young people to pursue science, technology, engineering and mathematic job opportunities by encouraging the uptake of STEM subjects. Innovate aims to address this issue by targeting students in Years 7 and 8 to build their confidence in these areas and increase their understanding and awareness of STEM careers.

The program involves small groups of students working with mentors over four, fully facilitated sessions to apply skills such as creativity, innovation and problem-solving. Mentors sharing their own career journeys and challenges can make an enormous impact as students consider their options for the future.













Interview 2 Impress

In Term 2, two groups of year 10 students participated in an Interview 2 Impress workshop run by ABCN. They were held at Fuji Film and KPMG. Interview 2 Impress is a half-day program designed to equip students with the practical skills needed to engage in employment options beyond school.

Interview skills are an essential tool in successfully pursuing post-school employment options and careers. While most students are taught about interview preparation at school, the opportunity to explore this topic and learn from a corporate employee adds considerable value. Mentors sharing their own career journeys and challenges can make an enormous impact as students consider their options for the future.

It enables students to test and practise the theory they learn at school by working with a mentor who is able to provide direct and relevant feedback and advice based on their own job interview experiences.

We all had a great time!

































GOLD UNIT FUNDRAISER


Navigating Compass
