
We are now in the process of holding our elections for the school council for 2024, 2025, and we are looking for up to 3 parents interested in participating in planning for the college.



Class of 2023 Pathways





Thai Tran from Red Unit The Paper Crane Champion!

Thai Tran, year 9 from Red unit has been on a mission this year. At the start of 2023 he made one paper crane. He was then challenged by the staff and students to make 1000 paper cranes before term 4 finished.

He was inspired from the story of Sadako Sasaki, a Japanese girl who became a victim of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

During Sadako's stay in the hospital, her best friend, Chizuko, came to visit her. Chizuko brought some origami (folding paper) and told Sadako of a legend. She explained that the crane, a sacred bird in Japan, lives for a hundred years, and if a sick person folds 1,000 paper cranes, then that person would soon get well. After hearing the legend, Sadako decided to fold 1,000 cranes and pray that she would get well again.

Although Sadako knew she would not survive, she folded well over 1,000 cranes and continued to be strong for the sake of her family. In October 1955, with her family standing by her bed, she died.

Thai has folded 1000 cranes and they are all displayed in the front office foyer. Not only has he been making paper cranes but he has also been making a whole range of other animals including cats, penguins, fish, lions and tigers.

I encourage all students to head to the front office where Thai's work is on display.

Minter Ellison ABCN GOALS program

On July 18th, a group of Year 9 students went to Melbourne CBD to take part in a 4-day program called the ABCN program. The ABCN program was hosted by mentors from Minter Ellison which gave students an opportunity to discuss their future goals that they wished to achieve with workers from the law firm. This gave a chance for students to understand the many possibilities and opportunities that Melbourne has to offer for their future, and this program helped them to break down their goals into small steps for them to complete during this program. Two sessions were taken at the Minter Ellison building, and two were undertaken at Thomastown Secondary via Zoom meetings.

During the first session of the program, students visited the Minter Ellison building where they were debriefed. The first session was about students stepping out of their comfort zone. By stepping outside their comfort zones, students-built their confidence and developed positive relationships with new people, which is a skill that will help them in all aspects of life.

The second session took place on August 9th in school where the students joined a Zoom meeting. From there students and mentors were split into small groups called the breakout rooms where they could interact with others and their mentors and talk about whether they achieved their goals or not, and what were the difficulties blocking them along the way.

The third session took place on the 24th of August. Students once again had a meeting at school on Zoom. The students and mentors talked a bit about how people would spend their money and whether it was a worthwhile expenditure. Students were also given an activity which involved investigating whether specific items are worth buying now or later. All the students and mentors completed this task and found out that some things are worth buying and others were not.

The 4th session was held back in the Minter Ellison offices on the 1st of September. Students finalised their goals and had to reflect on the program.












ABCN End Of Year Event


iBelong 2023 excursions to RMIT University




Mindflight7 See your future- Career Taster


Print-A-Car Finals

STEAM Lab is a once-weekly lunchtime club open to all students interested in extra training and activities related to science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics. This year regular club attendees were invited to attend a statewide conference that took place Friday the 17th of November at John Paul College in Frankston. Thomastown Secondary College was one of many schools presenting a workshop at this event to explain the beautiful periodic table display project created by 2022 VCD and Chemistry students. Our presentation was well received by students and teachers from other schools interested in the power of learning through designing for an audience.

Meanwhile, ten TSC students attended a variety of lectures and workshops on STEM education and opportunities. Year 7 student Mohit Mohit said it "was the greatest excursion I have ever taken part in, the activities were amazing especially the Artificial Intelligence Class as this class taught me the sensors of the heat/touch effect that some devices use". Fellow Year 7 Naveen Sakthivel said, "My favourite activity of the day was when the 2 keynote speakers spoke about their pathways and what jobs you might come across doing that degree... there are now machines to do surgery for doctors. It's amazing how machines can act and how they are programmed to help and assist". The conference was not limited to robotics but included all sorts of creative challenges in science, as Year 9 student Thai Tran "learnt how scientists know how many dolphins are in Port Phillip Bay." One keynote speaker showed all the techniques and technologies used to revitalise the Phillip Island penguin population. All of the attendees agreed that the conference "really 'sparked' new ideas and ways of thinking" and came back full of inspiration for next year. We will be recruiting teammates for competitions in car racing and video game design, so interested students should keep an ear out for club announcements next year!













Mobile Phone Ban

From Term 1, 2020 there was a new <u>mobile phone policy</u> for all government schools. Phones brought to school must be switched off and stored securely during the school day.

The aim of this policy is to provide:

- a safe environment to learn without inappropriate mobile phone use (including cyberbullying) or distractions
- greater opportunities for social interaction and physical activity during recess and lunchtimes.









Vaping Ban

In Victoria, a person must not smoke or use e-cigarettes on school premises or within 4 metres of any pedestrian access point to school premises.

The purpose of this policy is to support public health objectives and ensure there is no smoking or use of e-cigarettes (commonly known as 'vaping') on school premises (buildings and grounds).

In Victoria it is illegal for any person aged 18 or over to obtain, possess or use nicotine e-cigarettes, or e-cigarette cartridges containing nicotine, or nicotine liquids for use in a vaporiser, without a prescription. It is illegal to sell e-cigarettes to, or buy e-cigarettes for, any person aged under 18 years whether or not the e-cigarettes contain nicotine. Whilst it is not unlawful for a person to possess or use e-cigarettes that do not contain nicotine, it is unlawful to use them on school premises or within 4 metres of a school entrance.

At Thomastown Secondary College, Vape detectors have been installed to combat the issue around vaping in students restrooms.











Restricted Areas

Units please remind your students that they are not to be in the following areas at any time during the school day:

Staff car park

The side of the ECA next to the staff car park, including the concrete steps that lead up to the back doors of the ECA.

Behind the ECA next to the primary school fence. Behind the Language Centre next to the primary school fence. Anywhere along the primary school fence.

No phones in canteen

Students are reminded that phones may not be used to pay for food at the canteen.

Phones must be stored in lockers at all times.

Homework club

Homework Club runs from 3.30pm to 4.30pm every Wednesday and Thursday. Consent forms can be picked up from Sue in Gold Unit and Sandra in VCE Unit.

ECA open after school for all Juniors and Mids

The ECA is open to play whatever activity you want on Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays after school for Junior and Mid students only. Please see Unit Leaders or Clint in Red Unit for a permission form.
